

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Purpose/Objective

This policy provides clear guidelines and procedures to follow:

- when a child attending a Council Early Years Service shows symptoms of an infectious disease
- when a child attending a Council Early Years Service has been diagnosed with an infectious disease
- for managing and minimising the spread of infectious diseases, illnesses and infestations (including head lice)
- for managing and minimising infections relating to blood-borne viruses
- for managing and minimising infections related to epidemics (refer to Definitions) and pandemics (refer to Definitions) e.g. Coronavirus (COVID-19).

Scope

This policy applies to the staff, students on placement at kindergartens, volunteers, parents/guardians, children and others attending the programs and activities of Council's Early Years Services.

Background/Reasons for Policy

Infectious diseases are common in children. Children are at a greater risk of exposure to infections in an Early Years setting than at home, due to the amount of time spent with a large number of children. Infectious diseases are divided into four categories (A, B, C, D) on the basis of the method of notification and information required. The Victorian Department of Health has developed a document, *Minimum Period of Exclusion from Primary Schools and Children's Services Centres for Infectious Diseases Cases and Contacts*, to assist in protecting the public by preventing, or containing, outbreaks of infectious conditions common in schools and other children's services, and is regulated by the *Health (Infectious Diseases) Regulations 2001*.

An approved service must take reasonable steps to prevent the spread of infectious diseases at the service, and ensure that the parent/guardian, authorised nominee or emergency contact of each child enrolled of the service is notified of the occurrence of an infectious disease as soon as possible. The service must have policies and procedures in place for dealing with infectious

diseases (Regulations 4, 88). The service has a duty of care to ensure that everyone attending is provided with a high level of health protection during all hours that the service is in operation.

Protection can include:

- notifying children, families and educators/staff when an excludable illness/disease is detected at the service
- parents complying with exclusion periods and not sending their child for the exclusion period
- preventing the spread of vaccine-preventable diseases through simple hygiene practices such as hand washing, and effective cleaning procedures
- complying with relevant health department exclusion guidelines
- increasing educator/staff awareness of cross-infection through physical contact with others.

The Victorian Government offers an immunisation program for children, to assist in preventing the spread of infectious diseases.

Gender Impact Assessment

In accordance with the *Gender Equality Act 2020*, a Gender Impact Assessment was not required in relation to the subject matter of this policy.

Definitions

Term	Definition
Acceptable immunisation documentation	Documentation, as defined by the Immunisation Enrolment Toolkit for early childhood education and care services, as acceptable evidence that a child is fully vaccinated for their age, or is on a recognised catch-up schedule if their child has fallen behind their vaccinations; or has a medical reason not to be vaccinated; or has been assessed as being eligible for a 16 week grace period.

Blood-borne virus	A virus that is spread when blood from an infected person enters another person's bloodstream. Examples of blood-borne viruses include human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), hepatitis B, hepatitis C and viral haemorrhagic fevers. Where basic hygiene, safety, infection control and first aid procedures are followed, the risks of contracting a blood-borne virus are negligible.
Communicable Disease Section	Unit of the Victorian Department of Health with responsibility for communication and advice in relation to infectious diseases. The unit must be contacted by telephone on 1300 651 160.
Epidemic	The outbreak of a contagious disease that spreads rapidly and extensively, and affects many individuals simultaneously in an area or population.
Exclusion	Inability to attend or participate in the program at the service.
Illness	Any sickness and/or associated symptoms that affect the child's normal participation in the program at the service.
Infection	The invasion and multiplication of micro-organisms in bodily tissue.
Infestation	The lodgement, development and reproduction of arthropods (such as head lice), either on the surface of the body of humans or animals, or in clothing.
Infectious disease	An infectious disease designated by the Communicable Disease and Prevention Control Unit, as well as those listed in Schedule 7 of the <i>Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations 2019</i> .
Medication	Any substance, as defined in the <i>Therapeutic Goods Act 1989 (Cth)</i> , that is administered for the treatment of an illness or medical condition.

<p>Minimum exclusion period</p>	<p>The minimum period for excluding any person from attending a children’s service to prevent the spread of infectious diseases, as specified in Schedule 7 of the <i>Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations 2019</i>. An infringement penalty applies for failure to exclude a child with, or exposed to, a specified infectious disease (applicable to a person in charge). <p>Pandemic</p>	<p>An epidemic occurring worldwide, or over a wide geographic area and affecting a large proportion of the population.</p>
<p>Pediculosis (Head lice)</p>	<p>Infestation of head lice that is transmitted by having head-to-head contact with another person who has head lice. head does not contribute to the spread of any infectious diseases, and outbreaks of this condition are common in schools and education and care facilities.</p>
<p>Serious incident</p>	<p>A serious incident is defined (under Regulation 12, Education and Care Services National Regulations 2011) as any of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● the death of a child while being educated and cared for at the service or following an incident at the service ● any incident involving serious injury or trauma while the child is being educated and cared for, which <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ a reasonable person would consider required urgent medical attention from a registered medical practitioner; or ○ the child attended or ought reasonably to have attended a hospital e.g. a broken limb* ● any incident involving serious illness of a child while that child is being educated and cared for by a service for which the child

attended, or ought reasonably to have attended, a hospital e.g. severe asthma attack, seizure or anaphylaxis*.

**In some cases (for example rural and remote locations) a General Practitioner conducts consultation from the hospital site. Only treatment related to serious injury or illness or trauma are required to be notified, not other health matters.*

- any emergency for which emergency services attended^

^This means an incident, situation or event where there is an imminent or severe risk to the health, safety or wellbeing of a person/s at an education and care service It does not mean an incident where emergency services attended as a precaution.

- a child appears to be missing or cannot be accounted for at the service
- a child appears to have been taken or removed from the service in a manner that contravenes the National Regulations
- a child was mistakenly locked in or out of the service premises or any part of the premises

Examples of serious incidents include amputation (e.g. removal of fingers), anaphylactic reaction requiring hospitalisation, asthma requiring hospitalisation, broken bone/fractures, bronchiolitis, burns, diarrhoea requiring hospitalisation, epileptic seizures, head injuries, measles, meningococcal infection, sexual assault, witnessing violence or a frightening event.

If the approved provider is not aware that the incident was serious until sometime after the incident, they must notify the regulatory authority within 24 hours of becoming aware that the incident was serious.

Notifications of serious incidents should be made through the National Quality Agenda IT System portal

	<p>(https://www.acecqa.gov.au/resources/national-quality-agenda-it-system). If this is not practicable, the notification can be made initially in whatever way is best in the circumstances.</p>
Standard precaution practices	<p>Work practices that achieve a basic level of infection prevention and control. Using standard precaution practices aims to minimise and, where possible, eliminate the risk of transmission of infection, particularly those caused by blood-borne viruses. Standard precaution practices include but are not limited to hand hygiene, cleaning equipment and the environment, respiratory hygiene and cough etiquette and appropriate use of personal protective equipment.</p>

Evaluation

In order to assess whether the values and purposes of the policy have been achieved, the persons with management or control will:

- regularly seek feedback regarding the effectiveness of the policy
- monitor the implementation, compliance, complaints and incidents in relation to this policy
- ensure that all information related to infectious diseases on display and supplied to parents/guardians is current
- keep the policy up to date with current legislation, research, policy and best practice
- revise the policy and procedures as part of the Service’s policy review cycle, or as required
- notify all stakeholders, including parents/guardians, at least 14 days before making any significant changes to this policy or its procedures unless a lesser period is necessary due to a risk (*Regulation 172 (2)*).
